REFLECTION

REIMAGINE CAMPUS CULTURE FOR NEW GENERATION OF LEARNERS

As the world of work and life at large evolve, the higher education system, including the model of the campus, needs to evolve in parallel in order to remain relevant. We live in a highly competitive, changing and uncertain world and the challenges we face are unique and unprecedented in many ways.

Examining Malaysian graduates' outcomes such as employability and competitiveness shows a wide room for improvement. In 2021, the Ministry of Higher Education's (MOHE) Graduate Tracking Study System found that there were 41,467 unemployed graduates or 14.5 per cent of the total of 286,299 local graduates who completed their courses in that year.

Our universities are traditionally focused on the development of human capital through theoretical knowledge acquisition that is measured by exams. However, we need a holistic educational model that fosters graduates who are able to preserve, build, and enhance five types of capital: human capital, social capital, emotional capital, economic capital, and natural capital.

This will require the reimagination of campus life as an integral part of human development.

Recently the Minister of Higher Education, Dato' Seri Mohamed Khaled Nordin, shared a vision for a new model of campus life. Even the choice of language is important and "campus life" implies that authentic learning and development will happen through real life experiences. Done right, a new model of campus life has the potential to transform the higher education system in the country and support the cultivation of the necessary talent that will make Malaysia a high-income nation and contribute towards making the world a sustainable, equitable, and enjoyable place. In our view, this can only

be achieved through integrating academic learning and assessment into campus life, rather than seeing campus life as merely an extra-curricular activity. It is said that "it takes a village to raise a child." The campus needs to be the village and the community that will nurture, support and stimulate our youth to achieve their full potential.

Making this new model a reality will require a shift in mindsets, development of teaching skills, transformation in curriculum and assessments as well as the cultivation of a culture of exploration and experimentation (see next page).

It is essential to describe the broad lines of the new campus life model and allow different universities to explore the system rather than adopting a one-size-fits-all approach. Accepting an experimental approach and providing space for students and staff to innovate will be very important. Encouraging partnership between public and private universities will be highly desirable and engaging with the industry to bring the industry on campus will be essential for the success of this initiative.

We believe that the VCCPU members will be at the forefront of innovating and working with other stakeholders to make the new campus life a reality that will support the delivery of world-class student outcomes.




We need to develop a culture of exploration and embracing of experimentation where it is safe to try and fail. This will enhance resilience and cultivate an entrepreneurial mindset.



The community needs to move from being knowledge-acquisition driven to being purpose driven. Students and staff need to be equipped with a deep sense of purpose as this will be the only way to ensure that they will remain anchored, productive, and motivated in a continuously changing world.



The current assessment model is largely built on standardised exams. This needs to move into a personalised approach so that students can learn at a pace that is on par with their individual needs. Personalised assessments will also help support learning rather than just be a means of evaluation.





The curriculum we teach needs to be transformed from being subject-based to impact-based. What our students learn and practice needs to be designed so that it is consequential in the world. Students can learn through activities and projects that are connected to their sense of purpose while helping their local and global communities.




Academics need to develop new skills that enable them to support their students well beyond the classroom. They need to transform from lecturing to coaching. This will require some work but it is not unsurmountable.
